The following is a message appearing in the March issue of the Soroptimist International Magazine, from Carene Davis-Stitt, Editor.

“According to NetAid, an initiative of Mercy Corps, ‘ numerous studies show that educating girls improves the overall economic health of a developing country, promotes healthier and smaller families, decreases the spread of HIV and fosters democracy.’

As evidenced by the reports in this issue, we can be proud of our efforts, as Soroptimists, to support women and girls in their pursuit of an education that will benefit their families, their communities and their world. However, as we strive to give others a hand up through awareness,

advocacy and action, we must also remember to educate ourselves.

If we aspire to be the best women doing the Best for Women then it behoves us to pursue activities that expand our views, open our minds and allow us to explore new ideas. We need to be challenged, to be informed, to think critically and to engage our creative souls. When we push ourselves to learn something new, to try something different, we connect with the feeling that we have no limits. Then there will be no limit to what we can do to improve the lives of women and girls.”

Also in this issue of the International Magazine is an article about the Novato, California Women’s Opportunity Winner.

Excerpts as follows:

“Hannah Njuguna knew that without an education she could never pursue her dreams of a career in health care. Without schooling, she knew she would never be able to return to her homeland of Kenya and help those plagued by disease. But growing up in Africa in extreme poverty as one of 10 children, and being a girl, Hannah was always denied an education.When the family couldn’t afford to eat, Hannah was sent as a manual laborer into the tea and tobacco fields so she could financially support the family. She had to drop out of school.

When Hannah came to America with a green card, she entered the college of Marin in California to study nursing and

was also working full-time as a certified nursing assistant and home health aide. Still supporting the family she had to leave behind in Africa – her aging parents, siblings and five children – the single mother wasn't sure how she could continue to carry such a heavy burden. That's when she heard about the Soroptimist Women's Opportunity Award. Hannah was thrilled when she won, knowing she could finish her associate's degree in nursing without financial pressures."
